Activity 5 – The laws governing online behaviour



Sexual Offences Act 2003	<i>This Act states that it is an offence to engage in any form of harassment that has occurred via electronic means. For example, this can include repeatedly sending unwanted messages or repeatedly forcing unwanted contact online.</i>
Communications Act 2003	<i>This Act states that it is an offence to discriminate individuals on the ground of protected characteristics, including disability, gender reassignment, race, religion or belief, sex and sexual orientation. For example, this can include an individual posting a sexist comment online directed towards a person or persons.</i>
Protection from Harassment Act 1997	<i>This Act states that it is an offence for a person over the age of eighteen to engage in any sexual activity, including online, with somebody under the age of eighteen. For example, encouraging them to send sexually explicit images and/or videos of themselves.</i>
Equality Act 2010	<i>This Act states that it is an offence to steal an individual's identity online and/or impersonate another person online. For example, this can include sending a message to someone online while pretending to be a different person.</i>
The Computer Misuse Act 1990	<i>This Act states that it is an offence to send electronic communications that are considered grossly offensive or of an indecent, obscene or menacing character. It is also an offence if the communications cause annoyance, inconvenience or needless anxiety to another. For example, this can include cyberstalking.</i>
